There is a lot of construction but from what I can see, they are being remade with great attention to detail and workmanship. Also very noticeable to me was the infrastructure. Again probably designed after the war, it works. There is a lot of public

transportation and it runs smoothly in separate lanes even when the traffic is otherwise congested. The people we spoke to were mostly in tourist areas like hotels or restaurants

but all seemed well educated and spoke English better than our own citizens here in America.

Budapest is a walking city. It's easy to get around. The streets are well lit and the sidewalks are lined with trees and feel safe. We walked everywhere, even across the Chain Bridge which crosses from the Buda side to the Pest side and over the Danube. Nice memories on that. Of course I had to check out the famous Szechenyi Thermal Pool. The three



pools are surrounded by a Neo Baroque complex and have a Roman feel. It dates back to over a century. That was a full day of fun and relaxation. It was worth it. Another surprise to me was the New York Cafe. This wasn't mentioned in any of the tour



information for "things to do" but for me it was a must-do highlight. Inside is the elegance and charm of a time long ago. It is pure luxury, complete with live music even during the breakfast hours. This small cafe does not usually take reservations and the line to get in is always... shall we say, blocks long. I loved everything about Budapest.
